At St. James, you'll notice numerous folks involved in worship leadership: Ushers and greeters who help welcome, guide, and direct; Singers and Musicians that lead in song; Lectors (readers) who present the Word; Communion assistants who help serve the bread and wine: Acolvtes who light candles, carry banners, cross, Bible, etc. into worship; Technicians that work with audio, video, and internet livestream for worship; Altar Guild who make sure the sanctuary is prepared for worship, and the vessels, paraments, and linens are cared for: and. Visual artists who inspire and proclaim the Word through banners, paintings, floral decorations, liturgical dance, etc.;

For any given worship as many as 25 or 30 people can be involved in a leader-ship role.

St. James Safety Plan Active Shooter Protection



The Congregation Council recently adopted a safety measure for the congregation in the unlikely event of an active shooter situation during a congregational activity.

Rest assured that we have no knowledge or evidence of any impending threat or danger.

However, the Cumberland County Sheriff's Department encourages all places of worship to have a plan in place to help deter a threat, as well minimize dangerous situations.

The primary emphasis for St. James' members is an everyday instruction: be aware of your surroundings, situations, and people that might seem unusual or look out of place or seem.

We will begin operating this new plan on Sunday, June 4.

Here is the basic outline of the protection plan, considering our congregation, church buildings, and resources:

- 1) <u>Reinstate the "Rover" position</u> (prior to Covid, this position existed and was separate from Ushers or Greeters). The Rover will walk around downstairs and outside during the worship service. This step addresses deterrence. (Volunteers are needed for this duty. Please see Todd Burns or Dave Runkle for more information.)
- 2) <u>Limit access to the sanctuary / fellowship building</u> by locking ALL exterior doors with the exception of those in the Gathering Space (main doors that lead to sanctuary). We will place signage by all usual entrances directing everyone to the sanctuary entrance with a statement like "...in the interest of safety and security, this door remains locked...please use the main entrance/west side of building..." This step also addresses deterrence.
- 3) <u>Educate the Congregation</u> (Ushers, Rovers, Property Team, and Council Members **at a minimum**) on the Run, Hide, Fight plan. **Everyone can benefit from this education. The Congregation Council did the training at their meeting on April 16. More training sessions for ushers, team leaders, congregation will be scheduled soon.
- 4) <u>Identify interior doors</u> those that CAN and CAN NOT be locked or barricaded from inside the room (to classrooms and nursery, for example). Then we will install a simple device on the doors that lack proper security.

There is not an easy way to test or drill for this type of plan. But education and trust will be very helpful. We all will need to trust that the plan is in effect each Sunday, and that appropriate people have been trained for deterrence, as well as group safety. Please take advantage in the coming months as training classes are offered. If you don't wear your name badge on Sunday mornings, begin doing so. Engage in conversation with folks with whom you might be unfamiliar. Also, we might need to learn new paths into the building on Sunday morning.

During the last 10+ years, the property team and Congregation Council have provided various proactive steps for safety and protection to the congregation: Electronic Security Systems in both buildings; Fire escape plans; and, Youth and Children protection policies. This additional plan will continue to help us protect each other of risks that exist in our world today.

Experience God's Grace

Who should attend a Via de Cristo retreat?

The retreat is designed for those Christians who, having been informed of the methods and aims of the movement, believe that the retreat can strengthen them in their faith and bring them closer to Christ in their discipleship. Most of Eastern NC Via de Cristo's retreats are "co-ed" – for men and women. Once in a great while we will hold a men only or women only retreat weekend.



On Sunday, June 4, Lynne Hoffman, the Outreach Chair for *Eastern NC Via de Cristo*, will be at St. <u>James</u> to share and answer questions about the Via de Cristo faith-forming experience. Many of St. James members have participated in Retreat Weekends over the years, dating back to the 1980's. Each one returned with a renewed spirit of faith, an increased enthusiasm for sharing God's love, and a deeper desire to share the Gospel within our congregation and our community. Lynne will join with others from St. James to share their passion for this ministry, to answer questions, and to encourage others to consider being a part of a VDC weekend.

What is Via de Cristo?

Via de Cristo means "the Way of Christ." It is a name used by Lutherans for a movement of personal Christian renewal within the Church. Via de Cristo in Spain in the 1940s under the name of "Cursillo". Via de Cristo has been in North Carolina since 1976. It is a structured, well-thought-out method for renewing the faith of individuals, the congregations from which they come and the environments in which they live and work.

A Via de Cristo Retreat is an encounter with Christ in which the participant becomes a part of a community abounding in God's grace. It enhances and strengthens our personal relationship with Christ, with our Christian brothers and sisters and with the Christian community.

What is the goal of Via de Cristo?

The Via de Cristo has a goal – to change the world, to remake the world in Christ, and to restore all things to Christ. It is important to view the process of Via de Cristo as a movement and not as an organization. The Via de Cristo viewed as a movement means that it is an on-going process. The Via de Cristo movement does not work directly with the problems of the church and society but works to form groups of people who can deal with these problems.
