EASTERN NORTH CAROLINA VIA DE CRISTO

The Via de Cristo movement originated as *Cursillo*[®] in the late 1940s in the Spanish Catholic church and moved to the United States in the late 1950s. The Ministry began in the Lutheran church following laypeople and clergy attending a Catholic Cursillo in 1971, both in Iowa and Florida. The first Lutheran sponsored weekends were held in 1972 in Iowa and Florida and have now been held in over 30 states and some foreign countries.

Via de Cristo is the Lutheran expression of this method which is currently being used in many denominations including Episcopal, Methodist, Presbyterian, and Reformed churches.

A number of folks from St. James have been involved in Via de Cristo over the years. The congrega-

tion has benefitted as they have shared from the leadership that came through their growth in faith.

Lynn Hoffman, a member of Eastern North Carolina Via de Cristo team, will be at St. James June 4.

She will share the story of VDC, encourage participation, and have registration information available.

My name is Lynne Hoffman and I am one of the Outreach chairs on the Eastern North Carolina Via de Cristo. I worship at Resurrection Lutheran Church in Cary, NC and have been a member there for approximately 10 years now. I am originally from Long Island, NY and moved to North Carolina in 2007. I firmly believe that God had led me here to the place that introduced me to Via de Cristo in 2012, where I made my weekend at Camp Agape in Fuquay Varina, NC. The Cumberland County Sherriff's Department is encouraging all churches to review their safety policies. Because of the increasing levels of random violence across our country, St. James Congregation Council approved a policy regarding how we might respond if we experienced an active shooter situation.

Please be assured that THE SHERRIFF'S DEPARTMENT HAS NOT GIVEN ANY WARNING OR REASON TO BELIEVE THAT SUCH A SITUATION IS IMMINENT.

This policy will help us be safer in such an event, however. We will be distributing more information as time goes along. Thanks for your cooperation, understanding, and patience.
