There's something about the fall season of the year. The changing temperature (at least we hope for a change!), leaves changing color, the sense of pause and reflection from the landscape, and the sense of a new phase of "being" in the world.

The church begins new programs, choirs start rehearsals for fall and winter worships, pastors and worship leaders begin to think about Advent and Christmas worship ideas (please don't tell anyone we're already thinking Christmas!), and congregation councils are thinking next year ministry spending plans.

Ministry Spending Plan. That's what the OG's used to call *The Budget*. What are the anticipated expenses (I prefer the phrase *possible investment in ministry*) that we can expect in the next year (2024). A few folks at St. James have been reviewing and analyzing and projecting numbers for the last few weeks, and last Sunday they made their presentation to congregation council.

Council will review and present a final proposal to congregation in early November. Everyone will have an opportunity to look it over and think about how the dollars-and-cents we give get converted to actual ministry. In other words, how do people hear, see, feel, know, etc. that God loves, knows, forgives, accepts, etc. all people to the family of God? How does giving money during offering on Sunday translate into God's love on Thursday morning, or Saturday evening, or any other time of the week? (Thanks Jim, Gary, Sarah, and Stella!)

In the coming weeks, we will be sharing stories about how that has happened in 2022 and 2023, and how we might envision how God might share God's love through us in 2024. We'll share some numbers, a couple of goals, and a few scripture passages.

And, along the way, well ask each family or individual for two very important actions.

- ♦ First, to pray daily for God's Spirit to give direction and purpose to St. James; to offer specific ways we can make a difference in our communities; and to inspire us to be bold and creative.
- ♦ Second, we ask that you begin praying about your own intention of giving for the final three months of 2023, as well as for the 2024 year.

Stewardship ministry. It's the telling of stories about God's mercy and grace through the actions of the ministry of our congregation. It's inspiring one another with the hope and promise of the gospel. It's the celebration of God's fulfillment of God's promises. It's asking ourselves and one another how we support these ministries and share our gifts that are first shared with us.

So, be watching for more info, flyers, letters, emails, texts, posters, videos, etc. about how St. James Lutheran Church is *Attempting Great Things for The Lord* in 2024.


