Strengthening Community

The congregational council will present its recommended Ministry Spending Plan (MSP) for 2025 to the congregation soon. The MSP is just that - a plan; it is a way to estimate the financial investment needed for a ministry vision.



The most important word of that last paragraph is *vision* - a mental picture of a hoped-for goal. In St. James' case, it represents an answer to the question:

What is God calling us to do and to be in this place and time (Fayetteville during 2025)?

The congregation council has struggled for the last year to try and articulate an answer. What they have discovered is that it is a hard question to answer in detail. But, perhaps we have been overthinking it.

The first apostles had to work through their shock of the death and resurrection of Christ. Then they began to understand the power of the outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon the followers of Jesus. Then came the gatherings of the followers. They came for teaching, worship, fellowship, faithful interaction – in other words: *community*. I don't think that was a vision of Peter, James or John, but rather an overwhelming urge to help the followers create and grow in a faithful community. Sound familiar?

The congregation of St. James was formed in the fall of 1935. Several local Lutherans (Mr. and Mrs. Felix Campbell and Dr. L. E. McKnight) requested the Lutheran Synod of NC to begin a Lutheran church here. So, the Synod sent recently ordained Rev. Roscoe Fisher (who was working on a master's degree at UNC-Chapel Hill at the time), to see what might be possible. By mid-October, only 22 people gathered for the first worship service. *A congregation might not be possible*, was the report to Synod. Of course, our presence at St. James today serves as evidence that the forecast was incorrect.

Those first members had a vision – to create the atmosphere and setting for a Lutheran congregation for the community. That uncomplicated vision served the congregation well in the next two decades as thousands of Lutheran young men and families poured into Fayetteville (Fort Bragg) during WWI and WWII. They came from Lutheran places like Pennsylvania, North Dakota, Minnesota, Iowa, and New York and needed to hear the gospel spoken and lived out in Lutheran liturgy and welcome. The presence of a Lutheran community that proclaimed hospitality, grace, and love was paramount in their survival.

Think about how much has changed in the last 80+ years. We communicate with family at any time and place, and we can view happenings around the world in real time. But we still need a local community – a nearby, accepting, challenging, welcoming, faith-filled, and faith-building community – to ground us and support us.

Strengthening community can be a vision worth living into and to which we can invest our time, ability, and resources. The 2025 MSP for St. James will enable a grace-filled community to continue; it will encourage fellowship, faithful learning and study; it will provide uplifting and renewing worship; it will create the means to serve others; and it will foster an environment for faith to grow.

In chapter 2:42-47 of The Acts of The Apostles, gospel writer Luke describes some actions of the early church:

Acts 2:42-47 Contemporary English Version (CEV)

St. James Lutheran has a task ... a goal ... a vision for 2025. Continue to sustain and create a gospel proclaiming, faith-forming, and welcoming community.

Please be in prayer for the congregation council as they finalize the 2025 MSP recommendation.

Ministry Teams

The Congregation Council is focused on re-forming congregational ministry teams. Currently, the focus is in the areas of Stewardship, Evangelism, and Worship & Music.

The Stewardship Team works to inform, encourage, ask, and give thanks to the congregation for acts of generosity. Growing in generosity is a goal for all disciples – in sharing of time and creativity, as well as financial resources. The Stewardship Team helps the congregation "see the future stories of ministry" that can be told tomorrow, because of generous giving today.



Another area of focus for Stewardship Team is helping folks improve personal financial management habits and actions. A goal is to offer courses once or twice a year (i.e. Dave Ramsey, Thrivent, or others) for members of the congregation and community.

The Evangelism Team tells the stories of God that happen in, with, and through St. James Lutheran congregation and its members. They help develop, improve, and manage communication tools such as the church newsletter, Facebook page, website, digital communications, bulletin

boards, local advertising, signage and promotions, etc.



Worship & Music Team will assist the pastor and music director with developing, planning, and evaluating the various worship formats and music opportunities for St. James. Worship life is central to faith formation and relationship building for the congregation.



We will be needing three to five people on each of these teams, with a commitment to serve for up to two years. If you have skills, passions, or the desire to learn about any of these specific ministry areas, please speak to Pastor John or one of the Executive Committee (Kevin Hoffman, president; Valarie Brewer, vice-president; or, Nikki Rettman, Secretary).

A musical treat! HYMNSingers in concert at St. James on Sunday, November 17


