2025 Stewardship Campaign Update

We pray for God's power to encourage us and empower us we work and move toward a stronger community of faith. Through prayer, worship, study, service, and generosity the Spirit leads us into ministry – among ourselves as well as throughout our community.

We are about 30% of our 2025 Ministry Spending Plan goal of \$290,000. Rarely do we have intent responses to match the goal, but it is usually around 65-70%. If you have not returned an intent card yet, please do so soon.

Currently, 23 giving units [families] have returned giving intent cards, representing over \$90,000 of giving toward 2025 ministry plans. One of our goals is to have at least 50 intent cards returned.

*If you feel uncomfortable with indicating an amount, you can write a note indicating that "while I/we will be prayerfully contributing to God's mission through St. James, we cannot at this time make a specific intention."

Social Ministry Focus for January, 2025 Human Trafficking Survivors Awareness



For January 2025 we start our year off with our *Focus of the Month* to support human trafficking survivors in their walk. Christ expects no less of His followers. Human Trafficking is a form of modern slavery that occurs in every state, including North Carolina.

The National Human Trafficking Hotline works closely with service providers, law enforcement, and other professionals in NC to serve victims and survivors of trafficking by responding to human trafficking cases and sharing information and resources.

The NC hotline reported the following for 2023: 394 victims involved in 235 cases. Since its inception the National Human Trafficking Hotline identified 2502 cases of Human Trafficking with 7002 victims.

We are called upon to treat these neighbors with love as we help with the start of their new journey.

In January, we collect items to assist with the ministry of Magnolia Home of Hope.

Magnolia Hope is located in an undisclosed location in Eastern NC. It is a program that provides trauma-informed therapies, on-site schooling, life skills classes, and gardening classes for girls.
